Paris, May 4th. All French newspapers devote the greatest prominence to the strike in Great Britain.

One paper says that the strike affects the very existence of England and that the issue of the battle will reverberate far beyond the frontiers of Britain.

Another expresses the hope that every loyal British citizen will do his best to ensure the failure of the strike, while the Communist paper calls on French labour to support the proletariat of Great Britain.

The Railway Information Bureau states that the transport service for the supply of milk is working according to scheme. The necessary drivers are working their service and all is quiet.

London and North Eastern Railway. All the long distance milk and fish trains on the Great Northern Section have arrived according to schedule. 14 trains have been arranged in the South area to-day.

Great Western. All milk and fish trains have arrived at Paddington.
