

NEWCASTLE ELECTRICITY STRIKE. Employees of the Newcastle Electricity Supply Company went on strike when their time ended last night but there was no interruption of the supply of power.

DISTURBANCES AT GLASGOW. In the east end of Glasgow during yesterday disturbances occurred and several arrests have been made. The trouble arose through a party of miners marching to the tram depot where they imagined a number of student volunteers had been housed; police dispersed the attacking party.

SITUATION AT EDINBURGH. Some further disturbances occurred at Edinburgh last evening arising out of the Strike, stones were thrown at Corporation buses, the police dispersed the demonstrators and nine arrests have been made.

SCENES AT MIDDLESBORO. There were disturbances last night at Middlebore where an attempt was made to hold up a passenger train but the crowd eventually dispersed after having been harangued by the Mayor and the Members of the Town Council. Demonstrations had been made outside the Branch Office of the local newspaper and in another part of the town a motor bus was molested but order, however was soon restored.

MRS. STANLEY BALDWIN has organised a transport service for conveying business women and girls living in the suburbs to and from their place of business. This principally affects women and girls whose salaries might otherwise be jeopardised.

NAVY AND ARMY PENSIONERS AND THE STRIKE. The Executive of the National Association of Army and Navy Pensioners recommend their members to render every assistance in their power during the period of the National Emergency.

OWNERS OF MOTOR CARS, which might be damaged by irresponsible parties should examine their policies to see if they are covered by risks rising out of the strike.

THE COLONIAL WOOL MERCHANTS ASSOCIATION have decided to postpone indefinitely the public sale of wool and sheepskins until such times as circumstances permit of resumption.

CHIEF CIVIL COMMISSIONER announces two men have been arrested in Marylebone today for selling leaflets declaring that the Liverpool Police have gone out on strike. There is no truth whatever in the allegation and the two men will appear tomorrow morning at the Marylebone Police Court.

THE L.C.C. again started up two routes at 8 o'clock this morning. Over one thousand trained men are now available at the volunteer training centre at Chiswick. Services will be introduced as quickly as men can be passed through the training centre. Buses will be worked from 8 a.m. to 6 p.m. unless otherwise stated.

RAILWAY INFORMATION BUREAU. Southern Railway announces that additional services for today have been arranged. Train services for today in London and the Provinces are being maintained and additional trains are being added in all parts of the country. In the Home Counties branch lines are being re-opened. Additional trained engine-men are now available which considerably eased the situation and the prospects are brighter and hourly improving. Yesterday's improved services on the L.N.E.R. are being maintained today, with the addition of several important trains. There will be increased services in all districts. A considerable number of trains in the North Eastern area are running, being 32% more than yesterday. The Company cannot guarantee that certain long distance trains will complete their journey.

HOME OFFICE reports that in London and the Home Counties no serious trouble occurred yesterday. The L.G.C.C. service of buses were working smoothly but there was some interference with the transport of petrol from Fulham and Hackney Depots. Large numbers of ex Cavalry men and Polo players volunteered and were enrolled as extra mounted police. A crowd paraded the town of Brighton during the morning and visited various works but no disorder occurred. From Newcastle it was reported the Gasworkers were remaining at work and the stocks of coal are adequate. In Cardiff yesterday, during the afternoon a crowd including tram strikers thronged Queen Street and impeded the passage of vehicles, the crowd however was dispersed without casualties. Some Great Western men returned to work in Cornwall. In LIVERPOOL yesterday there was no disorder, a considerable body of volunteer labour was unloading ships, no interference reported and some strikers from the Power Station have returned. The White Star Liner "CERRIC" was unloading successfully and one steamer was unloaded only by volunteers.

The rumour that a large body of strikers have done damage at Crewe is proved entirely without foundation.
