

London Taxi Joint Strike:

London Taxicab Trades Union decided last night to join the general strike. This decision was reached at a meeting held at the headquarters of the Transport & General Workers Union. Despite the decision there were many taxis on the streets this morning.

Cross Channel Services:

Cross Channel Services from Belfast were cancelled yesterday with exception of services from Greenock. It is expected however that several will resume this evening.

The "British Worker" organ of the T.U.C. appeared for the first time with an eight page edition this morning.

Soviet Officials Executed:

Three officials of the Commissariat of the Soviet Government were shot yesterday by order of the People's Government. The charges against them were that they were at the head of the group of persons engaged in the Currency Department in an artificial attempt to inflate the gold currency. A numbers of others have been sentenced to many years.

Norway forbids the export of coal and coke to Great Britain and many sailings have been suspended owing to the coal strike.

A Naval Cadet train left Dartmouth for Plymouth this morning and the departure was witnessed by a large section of the general public.

G.W.R. Two milk trains arrived at Paddington this morning bringing normal supplies. A fish train from Milford Haven arrived last night.

In the reverse direction many trains have been arranged.

The Southern Railway ran 334 trains yesterday including services to and from Bournemouth, Brighton, Portsmouth, etc. There were also services to and from the Continent. This morning several trains were run from Hampton Court, Surbiton, Wimbledon, Coulsdon, and Sutton etc. These services will be continued throughout the day.

There will also be an improved main line service including services from Bournemouth, Portsmouth, Dover, Folkestone, etc.

A train for Dover will leave Victoria at 11 a.m. In view of the improved conditions the Public are recommended to call at the Southern Railway Suburban Stations as in many instances a fairly frequent service is being maintained.

The L.M.S. Railway have announced a considerable improvement in their service to-day. There will be services in each direction on the main lines and all important branches.

L.N.E.R. An express will leave Doncaster at 12.30 for King's Cross. Details of the train services will be exhibited at receiving offices and at all local stations.

It is hoped to run 33% more trains in the N.E. area, covering the main lines principally between York and Newcastle, and also on all important branch lines. Intending passengers should inquire at all local stations for details regarding all local services.

It is hoped also to run an improved service in Scotland to-day.

The L.M.S. announce that great quantities of the milk traffic arrived at their London stations this morning and were distributed without a hitch. It is proposed to run passenger trains at frequent intervals to-day between Kentish Town and Woodgrange Park. Details of the services will be made known at all local stations.
