LATEST NEWS OF THE SITUATION.

Although no official confirmation can be obtained it is stated that there is reason to believe that peace moves are taking place beneath the service. A member of the Miners Executive said that nothing tangible or concrete had yet been placed before the Miners Executive. Interviewed after the Meeting of the Miners Federation to-day, Mr. A. J. Cook said numbers of people have been approaching the Miners Officials with a view to getting a settlement of the deadlock. "I desire to repeat again what I said at News Cross namely that peace is possible at any moment on terms which will give economic security to the Miners.
